The Need

- Professional development (PD) activities are essential, but we lack time, money, etc...
- Can help deal with transition to more communicative instruction to meet new BNCC goals
- Can help us gain recognition and standing among colleagues

Background

- Web 1.0
 - Static information controlled by web developers and companies who could hire them
- Web 2.0
 - Interactive, user-friendly, social, participatory
 - Ease of publication has led to an explosion of information



Background

- How have these changes affected teacher professional development?
 - In the past, conferences, face-to-face classes, libraries
 - Nowadays, more options: blogs, podcasts, webinars, MOOCs, social-media 'chats'
 - How do we organize all this?
- Web 3.0
 - Key concept is content curation



What Are PLNs?


- A Personal Learning Network is a way to organize and curate your sources of PD
 - Network of learners who share and discuss information and ideas
 - Environment you have created for your studies
 - 'Facebook feed of information related to your field'
- Popular platforms include Twitter, Facebook, and LinkedIn

Why Are They Useful?

- Practice what we preach!
- 'No man (or woman) is an island': Innovation doesn't happen in a vacuum
- Organized approach to professional development
- More efficient 'troubleshooting'
-and perhaps job opportunities




How-To: Twitter

How-To: Feedly




- Organize various blogs/publications
